Workforce Survey Results: How Covid 19 Impacted the Acupuncture Profession





Goals of Survey

- How are practitioners affected
- How ASA members have adapted
- Share strategies with other members





Types of environments salaried or hired practitioners work in.

Environment	Number who work in environment (%)
Single practitioner	2998 (56.9%)
Group practice (w other acupuncturists)	672 (12.8%)
Integrated (alongside other health professionals	887 (16.8%)
Hospital	195 (3.7%)
Community Acupuncture	257 (4.9%)
No income from acupuncture	1400 (26%)
Other	4755 (90.3%)

Many practitioners had multiple sources of, or environments for, income.





Types of environments for contractors or those with self-owned practice.

Single practitioner	3626 (68.9%)
Group practice (w other acupuncturists)	683 (11.1%)
Integrated (alongside other health professionals	700 (13.3%)
Hospital	99 (1.9%)
Community Acupuncture	200 (3.8%)
No income from self-owned or contract work	552 (10.5%)
Other	4853 (92.2%)

Many practitioners used multiple business models.





Type of practice tools that you use

Tool	Number use that tool (%)
Acupuncture	5164 (98.1%)
Herbal Medicine	3559 (67.6%)
Other	2076 (39.4%)

Many practitioners used additional tools included cupping, bodywork, education, moxibustion, yoga.





Did your state or local government mandate or strongly suggest closing your clinic?

Government Mandate Closure	Response
Yes	3232 (61.4%)
No	1207 (22.9%)
Not Sure	805 (15.3%)

Most states mandated closure and few practitioners were unsure.





Did you close your practice even though you could have remained open?

Closed on own	Response
Yes	2433 (46.2%)
No	2266 (43%)
Why close anyway?	2172 (41.3%)

Comments: Most practitioners who closed voluntarily did so for health and safety reasons, acupuncture is non-essential, patients cancelled due to fear.






Have you reopened for in-person appointments?

No	1842 (35%)






Most commonly, practitioners are planning on reopening

Have you filed for unemployment?	2865 (54.5%)
Have you received unemployment?	2150 (40.8%)

PPP = Paycheck Protection Program

EIDL = Economic Injury Disaster Loan

Most members have requested assistance. Of those, some are still waiting for that assistance.

Are you able to modify your practice to follow local, state and national guidance?



- Let this be an awakening, not an excuse to shut down.
- Educate self on trauma, not only of the patients, but self
- Meditation and remembering we are all in the same boat, we are not alone in our financial stress.
- Don't fight it. Be water.
- Meditation, exercise, getting a moderate amount of COVID information.
- Nada auricular protocol, gratitude journal, help others, do something that will improve your future, make plans for future with goals.





The Future – most people report some concern/change

- Very optimistic. Upon reopening I'm back to 80% capacity.
- I am very optimistic. This pandemic has shown how essential acupuncture is.
- I had a very full practice prior to COVID. The pause during COVID helped me realize that I was over extending myself and needed a break. I will be scaling back my hours for the foreseeable future.
- I lost my job as a result of COVID. I am now forced to work on my own so I'm trying to be optimistic but it's difficult when I have bills to pay.





Summary

- Majority of practitioners report that they have been able to respond to local, state, and federal mandates.
- Supplies are available for most.
- Most have received financial assistance (if requested).
- Local, state, and federal organizations are being utilized for information and updates.
- Telemedicine is being used by many. Some started using telemedicine because of COVID.
- Many practitioners have multiple sources of income (resilience).
- Spirits are mixed, but most are optimistic, and planning to or are currently open.
